Dear,

"It won't fix itself. You can't just ignore it and it will go away."

It's a scan many women find themselves begrudgingly attending: The Mammogram. But it's one that Sharon Florent now attends willingly, year after year.

After conquering cancer three times, she learned that no matter what the test finds, she's facing it head-on and is never going to stop fighting for her health.

Sharon, who lives in Madawaska with her husband Joe, had little reason to worry about cancer. She had no family history with the disease.

But in 2004, a biopsy confirmed she had Non-Hodgkins Lymphoma. After 5 years of watchful waiting, chemotherapy, and two years of Rituximab (a monoclonal antibody drug), she was declared in remission in 2011. Three years later, she was diagnosed with Large B Cell Lymphoma. She underwent a more aggressive kind of chemotherapy and was back in remission by December 2014.

From those two experiences, Sharon knew how important early detection could be. She had been getting regular mammograms at St. Francis Memorial Hospital once she turned 50. Mammography machines use low-dose x-rays to create images of the breast tissue. There had been a time or two when she was called back for additional scans. However, those test results always came back negative.

When she experienced what she had thought was another false alarm, she figured that would be the case again. It wasn't.

She underwent a biopsy and learned in December 2016 that she had Ductal Carcinoma In Situ. It's a stage 1 non-aggressive cancer with a 98% survival rate. So, Sharon faced it head-on with a lumpectomy in 2017,

followed by chemotherapy and radiation. Other than losing her hair during treatment, she counts herself lucky that fatigue was her worst symptom.

Sharon won the battle and remains in remission today. She continues her screenings at St. Francis Memorial Hospital annually.

"The mammography staff are all very kind, caring and gentle and do everything to make you comfortable," she said.

Sharon feels fortunate that she doesn't have to travel far for her mammogram. However, the mammography machine at St. Francis Memorial Hospital is almost 12 years old and reaching the end of its lifespan.

We count ourselves extremely fortunate to have loyal donors who continue to demonstrate their dedication and commitment to the Hospital in a meaningful way throughout the year. We know that without their support for medical equipment like **the mammography machine**, the medical care we have come to know and expect at St. Francis could not be delivered.

This is why we hope that when you are making your Christmas list this year, you will also consider the gift of mammography with your support of \$25, \$50 or \$100 to local healthcare.

Amanda Dumas is the Charge Diagnostic Imaging Technologist at St. Francis Memorial Hospital. She says the new machine will bring 3D Digital Mammography to St. Francis – which provides clearer images of abnormalities within dense breast tissue and reduces false alarms by up to 40%.

"New mammography machines on the market today can simultaneously take a 2D image that we are used to taking and then also provide a 3D image - which can provide even more detail for at risk groups," she said. "This technology is now becoming a standard screening tool for high-risk individuals."

St. Francis Memorial Hospital is part of the Ontario Breast Screening Program (OBSP), which offers free scans to anyone who requires it in the community. In fact, throughout the whole OBSP program, St. Francis sees the highest number of women 50 years of age and older. The unit also provides screening and diagnostic mammograms to women who do not meet the OBSP criteria, such as those who have been treated in the past for breast cancer and require annual or bi-annual checkups, like Sharon.

"By purchasing a new Mammography machine, the community can be assured that they are **getting the** same standard of care as any other individual in a larger centre," Dumas explained.

The new unit also has design enhancements that will provide a more comfortable and ergonomic patient experience. This includes more rounded edges instead of corners, a curved compression paddle and quicker turnaround time for imaging, meaning less time positioned at the machine.

Dumas said the current machine continues to be operational, but as technology progresses, older machines are harder and more costly to maintain. This results in more downtime and potentially delayed appointments. When time is of the essence and early-detection is key, staff and patients depend on an up-to-date mammography machine.

"Our current machine *is still meeting all of the very high standards* set out by the Mammography Accreditation program as well as the standards that the OBSP requires. However, the older the machine gets, the less likely we can acquire replacement parts to continue operating it as expected," Dumas explained.

This holiday season, we will all depend on the Hospital to be for us 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, ready with critical equipment, like the mammography machine, to ensure we get the care that we need. If it is within your means this year, your kind gift of \$25, \$50 or \$100 will ensure the Hospital can do just that!

As someone who has used the local hospital since 1995, Sharon has seen many new advancements in terms of healthcare equipment and treatment. She hopes more women take advantage of the excellent screening services that staff, and the mammography machine, provide. Sharon wants women to be empowered, not reluctant, to get screened.

"It won't fix itself," she said of a cancer diagnosis. "You can't just ignore it and it will go away."
